Dear Parents and Guardians:

SOPHOMORES, JUNIORS AND SENIORS: ARMED SERVICES VOCATIONAL APTITUDE BATTERY (ASVAB)

On Wednesday, April 19 the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) will be administered to all students who have pre-registered for the three-hour exam. The ASVAB is an excellent opportunity for students to complete a career aptitude test that examines ten different areas including mathematics knowledge, mechanical comprehension, coding speed and general science, to name a few. Students interested in a military career must take the ASVAB for career training placement; however, all students can benefit from the information provided by this exam.

The exam is free of charge and administered by military testing personnel at the high school; however, there is no obligation to meet with military recruiters if a student participates in the testing. In fact, most students taking the ASVAB are solely interested in identifying their strengths and weaknesses in the skill areas named above. In addition, an excellent workbook highlighting personal traits and several hundred career occupations is distributed to students along with their test results. Results of the test are usually available within two to three weeks.

The course was added for you, however you received an unsatisfactory score if it was not completed. You need to complete this course to graduate.

The Career Explorations program has replaced the Graduation Project requirement for students starting with the Class of 2017. The purpose of this course is to teach students how to match personal needs and expectations with satisfying career options.

In Career Explorations, students will learn:

- * Self-assessment skills
- * To research major and career alternatives
- * To make decisions based upon sound factual information
- * To utilize a variety of resources

Students will need to complete an online course and digital portfolio using tools in Xello. They can access Xello through the Clever App. This work will mostly be done on the student's own time, however students will be introduced to Xello through their physical education classes. Students are free to complete the portfolio at any time on their own. Completion of this course will be determined when all online modules are complete. Upon completion, students will receive a 0.5 credit. Course completion does not factor into GPA or class work.

Students can access specifics about the expectations for Career Explorations on "Class of XXXX" course in

Schoology. The Schoology page has a screencast to walk the student

through the program and the requirements of the course.



The Summer Enrichment Information and Registration Packet is available for any student interested in taking a summer enrichment course (for advancement purposes).

The math courses offered through PHS include: Algebra 2, Geometry, College Algebra, and Precalculus, and all will run in an online format. While students will have a PHS Math Teacher as a facilitator, work is done through the online program, Edgenuity, and requires approximately 4 - 6 hours of time per day as these are full-year courses offered at an accelerated rate that are completed in approximately six weeks. The cost is \$450 per course. Note that these classes have a required, in-person final exam on Thursday, August 3 at 9 AM at Parkland High School.



Students currently in Biology, Algebra I and 10th grade English DO NOT need to sign up. You are automatically registered for the Keystone Exams.

DATES: THURSDAY MAY, 25 - WEDNESDAY, MAY 31 FINAL EXAMS ARE ADMINISTERED IN SCIENCE, SOCIAL STUDIES, MATH, ENGLISH, AND WORLD LANGUAGES AND ARE FULL SCHOOL DAYS FOR SENIORS

EXAM DAYS WILL BE FULL SCHOOL DAYS FOR SENIORS. SCIENCE AND SOCIAL STUDIES EXAMS WILL BE TAKEN IN CLASS ON THURSDAY, MAY 25TH AND FRIDAY, MAY 26TH. MATH, ENGLISH, AND WORLD LANGUAGE EXAMS WILL BE TAKEN IN CLASS ON TUESDAY, MAY 30 AND WEDNESDAY, MAY 31. MAKEUP EXAMS WILL BE ADMINISTERED ON THURSDAY, JUNE 1.





PROJECT VS. TEST

Teachers will have the option of assigning a project-based assessment instead of a traditional test. If a project is assigned,, it will be completed by all seniors before the exam date. If a traditional test is assigned, it will be administered on the exam dates. Teachers will communicate the format of the final exams to their students

EXEMPTIONS

In instances where a class is using a project for the final exam, exemptions will not apply as all will complete the project. Exemptions will only apply in instances where a traditional exam is administered.



EXEMPTION NOTIFICATIONS

Students will be notified of exemptions from traditional testing on or by Tuesday, May 23 for Science and Social Studies Exams and by Thursday, May 25 for Math, English, and World Language Exams.

ADDITIONAL NOTES

- Exam days are FULL DAYS for seniors.
- May 31st, the last day for final exams, is the last day for Seniors (except for those who have makeup exams to take on June 1st)
- If students are exempt from or do not have finals on scheduled exam days, families may report student absence(s) in accordance to our Attendance Policy.





FINAL EXAM SCHEDULE

ADDITIONAL NOTES


- Students are only required to attend the class period(s) in which they have a traditional exam (if not exempt) provided they have their own transportation.





Bring the following items with you when you purchase tickets:

- School ID is required.
- Cash or check made payable to Parkland School District.
 - Form for non-Parkland guest (if applicable).

PROM TICKET COST

- \$75 each ticket for students who have paid their class dues.
- \$100 each ticket for students who have NOT paid their class dues. This price only applies to the senior's ticket. Guest ticket costs \$75.

POST PROM TICKET COST

\$10 for each senior who paid class dues.
 \$35 each ticket for seniors who have NOT paid class dues. This price only applies to the senior's ticket if they did not buy a Prom ticket previously. Guest ticket is \$10.

• \$15 for each student if purchased at the door.

NON-PARKLAND GUEST INFORMATION

- If you are purchasing a ticket for someone who is NOT a PHS student, you must fill out an information form and register him/her at the time of the sale. The guest form requires an Administrator's signature from the school the guest attends.
 - All guests must be UNDER 21 years of age.
 - Everyone should arrive at Prom and Post Prom with proper ID.
- All guests must arrive with a Parkland senior or they will be denied entry.



Allergy Season


Spring has arrived and so has allergy season. This time of year is sometimes difficult and uncomfortable for students who have allergies.

Be Prepared to be on the Road this Spring



Master Driving in the Rain

Spring showers can create tricky driving conditions Turn on your headlights, drive slowly and give other vehicles more space. Even a little rain can combine with oil on the road to create slippery conditions.

Look for Leftover Sand and Salt

Many towns use sand and salt to combat icy roads in winter, but once the snow is gone, sand and salt often remain and can make traction difficult. Take care at intersections and give yourself some extra time to come to a stop when breaking.



Steer Clear of Hail

Driving in a hailstorm is dangerous because ice is coming at you while you are trying to manage wet roads and rain. To avoid hail damage, it is best to stay off the roads. If you are already on the road, pull over and seek shelter to wait out the hailstorm.

Avoid Flooded Roads


If you are approaching a flooded road, turn around and find a safe route. Standing water is particularly dangerous because there can be strong undercurrents and it is difficult to tell if you are looking at just a puddle or deeper water.





Stay off Shoulders

Winter erosion followed by spring rains and flooding can soften gravel shoulders and wash away the ground underneath. Your best bet is to avoid driving and parking on gravel shoulders.



The best way to handle potholes is to avoid them. If you cannot avoid one, it is best to slow down and release your brakes right before you drive over the pothole. This reduces the speed of impact and minimizes effects.





Watch for Animals

If you see an animal on or near the road, slow down and prepare to stop. If an animal is in the road, brake instead of swerving. Be on alert especially at dusk and in rural areas.



The spring brings an increase of motorcycles, bicycles and pedestrians. Watch for others and be cautious in areas with children.

Fentanyl Facts

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. It is a major contributor to fatal and nonfatal overdoses in the U.S.

There are two types of Fentanyl: pharmaceutical fentanyl and illicitly manufactured fentanyl.

Both are considered synthetic opioids. Pharmaceutical fentanyl is prescribed by doctors to treat severe pain, especially after surgery and for advanced-stage cancer. Most recent cases of fentanyl-related overdose are linked to illicitly manufactured fentanyl, which is distributed through illegal drug markets for its heroin-like effect.



Student Assistance Program (SAP)

Fentanyl is often added to other drugs because of its extreme potency, which makes drugs cheaper, more powerful, more addictive, and more dangerous.

Illicitly Manufactured Fentanyl

Illicitly manufactured fentanyl (IMF) is available on the drug market in different forms, including liquid, powder and pills. Powdered fentanyl looks just like many other drugs. It is commonly mixed with drugs like heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine and made into pills that are made to resemble other prescription opioids (OxyContin, Vicodin, Percocet), benzodiazepines, (Xanax, Lorazepam), and ADHD medications (Adderall, Ritalin). In its liquid form, IMF can be found in nasal sprays, eye drops, and dropped onto paper or small candies.

Fentanyl-laced drugs are extremely dangerous, and many people may be unaware that their drugs are being laced.

What Does Fentanyl Poisoning Look Like?

Fentanyl overdoses appear very similar to other opioid overdoses. Atypical symptoms due to fentanyl have been reported, including:

- Immediate blue or gray lips
- Body stiffening/seizure like activity
- Foaming at the mouth
- Confusion before becoming unresponsive


