

HELP MITIGATE THE SPREAD OF CORONAVIRUS

The flu season continues to be in full swing through April and this season is complicated by the pandemic. Please check in with your doctor, as it is recommended that your student receive their flu vaccine at this time.

GUIDELINES FOR SENDING YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL



These are the same criteria the Health Room uses as a guideline when sending students home ill from school.

To help stay healthy and decrease the spread of illness in the school, we are encouraging all families to adhere to the following guidelines for sending your child to school. Please keep your child home from school (even if they have a test or sporting event) if he/she is experiencing any of the following symptoms:

- ▼ Fever of 100 degrees or more
- ♥ Vomiting/Diarrhea
- ▼ Severe head cold
- ♥ Persistent cough
- Severe sore throat

Students should not return to school until they are fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medications.

All eleventh-grade students should return their physicals to the nurse's office as soon as possible.


JUNIORS SOPHOMORES

▼ Immunization Requirement: The meningitis vaccine is required on or after your student's 16th birthday. Students in the 11th grade will be required to have this immunization on the first day of their senior year at Parkland High School. The 11th grade physical is a good time to make certain this immunization is completed.

All tenth-grade students will soon receive paperwork for completing their mandated physical for the eleventh grade. This can be done at the time your student gets their physical for their driver's permit but may not be completed before July 1, 2020. The form for the school physical you receive is the preferable paperwork to be completed. However, copies of the physical forms used for the driver's permit are accepted for the student's school physical. Please return the choice form to the Health Room as soon as possible to indicate how the physical will be completed. Forms are available on the PHS website.

She's Still Proud Of District Name

Mary Lou Urffer, a 15-year-old sophomore at South Whitehall High School, gave Parkland School District its name in 1948.

She chose the name because "the beautiful farms and well-kept homes with park areas in both of these townships suggest a common idea in the name Parkland."

The name was selected from more than 100 contest entries from children in North and South Whitehall school districts. Miss Urffer won \$15 as the winner.

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Today, Mary Lou is the wife of Rodney K. Schlauch of Slatington Rt. 2. She is the mother of two teenaged boys.

"The fact that the school district has changed so drastically is really something," she said.

A daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Robert J. Urffer, she lived in Neffs at the time the two townships merged into Parkland. Upper Macungie joined in 1951.

"I felt if the name of the district would be Parkland, it wouldn't just belong to South Whitehall or North Whitehall. It would belong to both. It gave me a better feeling knowing it was everybody's school. Kids were very sensitive to this type of thing then."

Now, Parkland is a household word and is known widely.

"Every once in a while somebody remembers that I was the one who gave Parkland its name," Mrs. Schlauch said. "I still feel a sense of pride when people bring the matter

10th GRADE DRIVER EDUCATION THEORY CLASS

All students are required to complete a driver education theory class as a graduation requirement. There are three options. Each option will provide your child with a Certificate of Completion. Save this certificate. Give your insurance company a copy of it. You are likely to obtain an insurance discount for your new driver.





Option 1

In-class Driver Ed Theory

- One semester course either marking periods 1 and 2 or marking periods 3 and 4 (depending on schedule availability).
- Classes meet 4 periods for each 6-day cycle during a student's scheduled semester.
 - 2 double periods each cycle OR 4 single class periods each cycle.
- Students receive a certificate of completion after passing a midterm and final exam.
- Class provides a variety of learning experiences, including but not limited to:
 - 'Share the Road' tractor trailer/blind spot demonstration.
 - ▼ LVHN Driving Simulators.
 - Gift of Life Presentation on the facts on becoming an organ/tissue donor.
 - Survival 101 program, presented by South Whitehall Police Department School Resource Officer, Tom Bammer.
- Students are eligible to get their permits on or any day after their 16th birthday; this class does not need to be completed for them to get their permit (although it helps).

Students wishing to free up time in their schedule to register for other electives during the 2021-2022 school year may select one of these two options:

Option 2

Summer Enrichment Program

This Pennsylvania state approved in-class theory course is an accelerated version of the semester offering. Due to time constraints, guests and demonstrations are not likely to be included but all aspects of safe and defensive driving procedures are completed.

This course *must* be completed in the summer between 9th and 10th grade or your child will be enrolled in the semester course in 10th grade. Summer Enrichment course registration is available. See page 2 of this newsletter and upcoming PHS Parent Newsletters under the title 'Summer Enrichment Programs.' There is a \$150 fee for this 30-hour classroom theory program. Students receive the same certificate as the students of the In-Class Driver Ed Theory course upon successful completion. This is a synchronous online class starting in late June.

Option 3

Online Theory Course Offered Through the CLIU-21

A Pennsylvania state approved program allows students to complete driving theory information at their own pace. This course offers no human component, speakers, nor demonstrations.

There is a \$150 fee for this online option and students receive a certificate upon completion. This certificate *must* be forwarded to the PHS Guidance Office or students will automatically be scheduled for the in-class theory course.

Behind-the-Wheel Instruction Optional Program Offered through the CLIU-21

- Students must complete one of the 3 options listed above and possess a Pennsylvania Learner's Permit prior to registering.
- ▼ There is a \$290 fee for this program but it offers many benefits:
 - Students will receive 6 hours of behind-the-wheel practice with a certified instructor.
 - Lessons/Skills practiced are well-planned and structured to expose new drivers to a variety of road and traffic situations.
- Once enrolled online, students may choose the day, date, time and instructor of their choice. Weather permitting, cars are out every day after school, Saturdays, Sundays and many holidays. This program is offered all year, including during the summer months.
- When students complete their 5th lesson successfully and their 6-month practice period has passed, they can take their behind-the-wheel Driver's License test here at PHS.

LEARN ABOUT MARAJUANA RISKS

Marijuana use comes with real risks that can impact a person's health and life. Marijuana is the most commonly used illegal substance in the U.S. and its use is growing. Its use among all adult age groups, both sexes, and pregnant women is going up. At the same time, the perception of how harmful marijuana use can be is declining. Increasingly, young people today do not consider marijuana use a risky behavior. But there are real risks for people who use marijuana, especially youth, young adults, and women who are pregnant or nursing. Today's marijuana is stronger than ever before. People can and do become addicted to marijuana.

"Approximately 1 in 10 people who use marijuana will become addicted. When they start before age 18, the rate of addiction rises to 1 in 6."

Marijuana use can have negative and long-term effects: **Brain health:** Marijuana can cause permanent IQ loss of as much as 8 points when people start using it at a young age. These IQ points do not come back, even after quitting marijuana.

Mental health: Studies link marijuana use to depression, anxiety, suicide planning, and psychotic episodes. It is not known, however, if marijuana use is the cause of these conditions.

Athletic Performance: Research shows that marijuana affects timing, movement, and coordination, which can harm athletic performance.

Driving: People who drive under the influence of marijuana can experience dangerous effects: slower reactions, lane weaving, decreased coordination, and difficulty reacting to signals and sounds on the road.

Baby's health and development: Marijuana use during pregnancy may cause fetal growth restriction, premature birth, stillbirth, and problems with brain development, resulting in hyperactivity and poor cognitive function.

Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and other chemicals from marijuana can also be passed from a mother to her baby through breast milk, further impacting a child's healthy development.

Daily life: Using marijuana can affect performance and how well people do in life. Research shows that people who use marijuana are more likely to have relationship problems, worse educational outcomes, lower career achievement, and reduced life satisfaction.

Marijuana Addiction

Contrary to popular belief, marijuana is addictive. Research shows that:

- 1-in-6 people who start using the drug before the age of 18 can become addicted.
- ♥ 1-in-10 adults who use the drug can become addicted.

Over the past few decades, the amount of THC in marijuana has steadily climbed; today's marijuana has three times the concentration of THC compared to 25 years ago. The higher the THC amount, the stronger the effects on the brain-likely contributing to increased rates of marijuanarelated emergency room visits. While there is no research yet on how higher potency affects the long-term risks of marijuana use, more



THC is likely to lead to higher rates of dependency and addiction.

About Marijuana: Marijuana refers to the dried leaves, flowers, stems, and seeds from the Cannabis sativa or Cannabis indica plant. It is a psychoactive drug that contains close to 500 chemicals, including THC, a mind-altering compound that causes harmful health effects. People smoke marijuana in hand-rolled cigarettes, in pipes or water pipes, in blunts, and by using vaporizers that pull THC from the marijuana. Marijuana can also be mixed in food (edibles), such as brownies, cookies, and candy, or brewed as a tea. People also smoke or eat different forms of marijuana extracts, which deliver a large amount of THC and can be potentially more dangerous.

Rise of Marijuana Use

Today, marijuana use is on the rise among all adult age groups, with people ages 18-25 having the highest rate of use. Marijuana and THC remain illegal at the federal level, even though many states have legalized its use. In states where legal, marijuana is a fast-growing industry with sales to individuals over 21 in retail stores, wineries, breweries, coffee shops, dispensaries, online, as well as grown at home.

The verbal classes will help students prepare for the verbal section of the SAT by providing practice, test taking strategies, and test simulation in the areas of critical reading, evidence-based writing, and contextual vocabulary. The math classes will help students prepare for the math section of the SAT by providing practice, test taking strategies, and simulated test taking in the areas of algebra, geometry and trigonometry including problem solving, data analysis, and practice in ratios, rates and proportional relationships.

for Juniors and Sophomores

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all Spring 2021 SAT Prep classes at PHS will be offered virtually only. There will be no face-to-face instruction. The course will consist of 10 two-hour sessions, five for each of the verbal and math components of the SAT exam. Students may register for one SAT prep session. Either an after-school session (3PM - 5PM) or an evening session (6:30PM - 8:30PM).

Parkland High School will offer an SAT Prep Course this spring to help students prepare

for the SAT Exam that will be administered on Saturday, May 8, 2021. Students who participate in this course will receive preparation for both the verbal and math portions

AFTER SCHOOL SESSION (3PM-5PM) OR **EVENING SESSION** (6:30PM-8:30PM)


Important information about the course:

- Classes will be held via ZOOM or Google Meet at the discretion of the instructors. The instructors will communicate the ZOOM or Google Meet link to enrolled students.
- In the interest of scheduling, students may only select one session, after-school or evening, and may not combine after-school and evening sessions.

The book will be available for students who have completed the online registration AND whose payment has been received. The SAT Prep Book will be available for students to pick up from March 15 through March 26.

 - Online students: Please pick up your book at the school via the Main Office entrance on one of the following days between 8AM-3PM: Wednesday, March 17

Dear Parents/Guardians.

We are proud to serve the students of the Parkland School District. The District continually strives to provide a safe and secure learning environment for all students and staff in our school buildings.

In order to maintain a safe environment for your children to study and learn, it is necessary that we practice our emergency response plans by conducting drills that exercise our procedures to better prepare staff and students. There are a few basic response drills as stipulated by the Pennsylvania Department of Education that we practice throughout the school year – *Lockdown*, *Shelter-In-Place*, and *Evacuation*. Parkland School District adopted the active assailant protocol endorsed by the Department of Homeland Security called *Run*, *Hide*, *Fight* as of August 2018.

Act 44 of 2018 stipulated that commonwealth schools conduct one security-based drill within the first 90 school days in lieu of a monthly *Evacuation Drill*. The law also allows commonwealth schools to replace an additional monthly *Evacuation Drill* with a security-based drill after the first 90 days of school. Parkland School District conducts annual *Lockdown Drills* to meet this requirement during the months of October and February.

In accordance with Act 44 of 2018, we will be conducting a security-based drill by practicing a *Lockdown Drill* with all students and staff members. As part of the legislation, Parkland School District will invite local law enforcement to help evaluate and improve our emergency protocols and practices. Feel free to contact your building principal or myself with any questions or concerns.
